3. LAND USE ACTIVITY NO. 4: Making Growth Boundaries Effective

It is a demonstrated phenomenon that development will follow infrastructure; therefore infrastructure construction without proper planning, can lead to sprawl. Local government can encourage planned development and discourage sprawl-like development through the installation/improvement of, or absence of, public facilities. It is recognized that, at times, there is the need to extend public services to areas outside of growth boundaries where private on-lot facilities (septic systems/wells) have failed.

The need for planning consistency and cooperative efforts becomes critically important as demonstrated above. The need to coordinate the County's Sewer Facilities Plan (Act 537) as well as encourage coordination of municipal level community Act 537 Sewage Facilities Plans with the growth boundary goals of the land use plan becomes imperative. The 537 Plan should limit sewer line extension to within the intended growth boundary. The County and its municipalities should also work with other agencies providing public services, to encourage them to limit their facilities to within the intended growth boundaries to the greatest extent practical.

I.6. Development and Implementation Strategy

To think realistically on our perception of environmental, cultural, and economic health involves commitment to continuous activity to implement projects which obtain this plan's objectives.

Past planning efforts, although good, were followed by inaction. This inaction has resulted in problems for both rural and more urban municipalities. Without activities to implement this plan, the careless permission of incompatible land uses will continue to fragment neighborhoods, consume excessive natural resources, and lessen economic stability, and diminish the sense of community and quality of life. This obligates us to begin to leverage tools available to us. For example:

Financial Incentives and Assistance: There are several State programs in place that encourage community and economic development in existing communities and to sustain agricultural lands. Keystone Opportunity Zones, the Project for Community Building, and the Land Recycling Program are programs that support the revitalization of distressed areas.

Education: Education is the key to making it all happen. The County realizes the importance of education on its ability to effectuate this plan and to implement sound practices that are supported herein.

This will entail prioritization of short term goals and long term goals to be reached. Solicitation of volunteers to gel economic, environmental, and cultural components of this plan would probably help develop the type of stewardship necessary to "keep the vision alive." Stewardship will involve the development of incentives, policies, and procedures that foster partnerships, cooperation, mutualism, and common goals among individuals, agencies, communities, developers, governments, and other institutions.

The implementation strategy begins with the following:

1. The County Planning Commission will evaluate the Comprehensive Plan every two (2) years and make recommendations to the Commissioners for proposed amendments, revisions, or changes resulting from growth and growth management occurrences from the two (2) years preceding. Annual recommendations will be made regarding needed implementation i.e., studies, plans, ordinances.

All development projects will be evaluated in terms of compliance with the Comprehensive Plans goals and objectives. The County plans to work closely with the agencies identified in the plan introduction to promote success of overall planned economic development.

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2. As public involvement allows the fruition of appropriate committees to work towards the objectives of this plan, annual recommendations should be able to become more focused as new recommendations build on accomplished objectives. The first objective will be to develop a County wide subdivision and land development ordinance.


I.7 Statement of Intergovernmental Cooperation and Plan Interrelationship

- 1. Elk County will undertake activities relevant to maintaining an effective committee system directly related to implementation of this plan.
- 2. Elk County will make sure that all County regulation, policies, and procedures are fully coordinated with this plan and cross referenced.
- 3. Elk County will develop and improve liaison mechanisms for the presentation of regional inputs to State and Federal agencies.
- 4. The County will establish an effective interface between the Planning Commission's planning activities and those planning and implementation activities performed by other local, public and private agencies in order to provide for more effective coordination of programs, delivery of services, and effective utilization of resources and plan implementation.
- 5. The County will serve as an information source to agencies concerned with the physical, economic and cultural development of the County.

This plan is focused on planned controlled economic growth in a manner which preserves the cultural history, pristine environment, and beautiful rural landscapes in Elk County while maintaining and fostering quality of life and improved standards of living for residents and consumers.

Understanding individual plan interrelationships becomes "the primary" key to effective implementation. All development needs to recognize and accomplish the goals set forth in individual plans within this comprehensive study and plan.

This Comprehensive Plan is a "base" plan and community involvement should only "begin" here. For example, from this plan and individual plan components, other plans may be developed to effectuate the comprehensive planning goals. Example:



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A housing development, for example, must be developed to achieve not only the goals set forth in the Housing Plan, but also goals set forth in the Public Services Plan, the Recreation Plan, the Economic Plan, and the Land Use Plan to move development forward in a compatible manner consistent with the Comprehensive Plan.

This plan should be viewed as the "hub" with effective planning tools developed from this hub to form the "spokes". The spokes being such a development of subdivision and land development ordinances or revision to existing ordinances, Act 537 sewage facilities plan updates, development of zoning ordinances or revision of existing zoning ordinances, development of a committee to ensure plan implementation, and to educate municipal officials, developers, and other entities responsible for directing development in available methods to effectively accomplish the goals established herein.
